Trending Questions

Q: What is the difference between bills and motions? How do motions pass in the Legislature?

A: A bill is a proposal that either creates a new law, or changes or repeals an existing law. An example of a recent bill that was introduced is a bill to make September 28 in each year Test Your Smoke Alarm Day. On the other hand, a motion is a proposal for the Legislature to do something, order something to be done, or express an opinion. An example of a recent motion in the Legislature was to allow MPPs to wear daffodil pins while sitting in the Legislature in recognition of the Canadian Cancer Society's daffodil campaign. A motion that passes is not a law.

There are two ways for a motion to be voted on in the Legislature. Most motions have to be debated by MPPs and afterwards, a recorded vote is taken. This means that the MPPs who vote in favour and against the motion are written into the public record. These motions only need a majority of MPPs to vote in favour for it to pass. If the mover of the motion wishes to have it passed without debate, they can request an oral vote. An oral vote is not recorded and requires unanimous consent from MPPs to pass. If at least one MPP votes no, the motion fails to pass.

Cutting Red Tape to Build More Homes

If passed, the legislation will also streamline approvals for student housing, support standardized designs to reduce delays and costs, and support innovative construction methods.
